# QUESTIONS FROM THE CAREER STUDIO

The most frequently asked questions our Peer Career Support Team gets



#### **Question One:**

How do I tailor my CV to the job description?

#### **Answer:**

- Your professional summary is a good place to start! Introduce yourself, discuss a few key skills from the person specifications, and highlight your interest in the company or organization at hand.
- Make sure to address as many skills as possible: chances are, you have done different things in your job or volunteering experience, so you can tweak your bullet points to showcase the necessary skills.
- Don't forget about the academics as well! You can cherry-pick which ones of the modules/ group projects/coursework are most relevant to the job you're applying for and elaborate on them in your CV.



#### **Question Two:**

Is my CV appropriate for the UK?

#### **Answer:**

- UK CVs should not include protected characteristics like gender, nationality, or a photo.
- Keep the format clean and professional, avoid unusual designs or colours.
- Use the university CV templates as a starting point, they're a great guide to UK standards.

#### **Question Three:**

 Where can I find internships/part-time roles/graduate positions to apply for?

#### **Answer:**

- Start with UofG Target Connect it lists opportunities exclusive to UofG students.
- Some other platforms to check out: Bright Network, Gradcracker (for STEM students), LinkedIn.
- Sometimes it's worth employing a speculative approach and trying to create opportunities for yourself.

#### **Question Four:**

 How do I go about a job application if I don't have any experience?

#### **Answer:**

- It's completely normal to feel this way, especially while balancing uni and personal life. But experience is broader than you might think!
- In the UK, apart from the traditional work experience (internships/ parttime work/ placements), you can draw on volunteering, involvement with societies, academics, and even personal projects and hobbies!
- Focus on your transferable skills; you don't always need directly related experience to show you're a great fit. Think teamwork, communication, problem-solving, and more.



#### **Question Five:**

What about Cover letters?

## Helpful Resource: UofG templates

#### **Answer:**

- First, check what's required. A cover letter is more flexible and motivationfocused, while a supporting statement requires you to address each selection criterion point by point.
- Avoid just listing your experience; connect it to the role and the company. Show how your skills are relevant and how you can add value.
- Do your research! Look at the company's website, socials, and recent news. You can even connect with staff on LinkedIn to ask questions.
- Use this knowledge to demonstrate genuine interest; it helps you stand out and shows you know what you're applying for.
